<i>A higher proportion of children have the opportunity to partake in sports fixtures</i> <i>- Spreadsheet kept up to date to track the pupils who attended fixtures and those who had now.</i> <i>- ALL children given the opportunity to attend an event</i> <i>- SEND pupils – additional risk assessments to ensure that they could partake too</i> <i>Total spend: £820</i>	<i>Key indicator 4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.</i> <i>Key indicator 5: Increased participation in competitive sport.</i>	<i>Approximately 70% of Y2-6 pupils have taken part in a fixture and represented the school during the year.</i> <i>All children who expressed interest in representing the school had the chance to take part in a sporting fixture.</i>	<i>The majority of children have been eager to represent the school in fixtures held this year.</i> <i>There are still some pupils who are not keen to take part in these competitive sports – this is a target for next year to support these children in feeling confident in their sporting abilities. We will look into hosting some fixtures which may be more appealing to these pupils.</i>
<i>More opportunities for children to join sporting clubs</i> <i>- Employed a sports coach to lead active sport sessions during lunch times</i> <i>- Employed sports coach to lead sports clubs after school – these have changed over the year to give as many children as possible the chance to join</i> <i>- Careful choice of activities to promote sports not delivered in our curriculum (archery, dodgeball)</i> <i>Total spend: £5,555.16</i>	<i>Key indicator 3: Raising the profile of PE and sport across the school, to support whole school improvement.</i>	<i>Children have enjoyed the sporting activities that have happened during lunch times. It has increased the activity for pupils who would not normally engage in sport.</i> <i>Most after school clubs were filled throughout the year. Lots of the clubs have a large number of disadvantaged pupils attending which has made a positive impact on their mental health/ supported the families.</i>	<i>Next year, we will be exploring another sports teaching provider who will continue to run lunch and after-school clubs at no cost to pupils. They will also start a 'Play-leader' training programme for our Year 6 pupils at lunchtimes. Year 6 pupils will learn games to increase activity which they can then lead with the younger children.</i>

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	53%	<i>1 EHCP child with a physical disability that prevents her from joining in with the swimming.</i> <i>5 non-swimmers with no experience prior to swimming lessons</i> <i>13 pupil premium children in cohort (45%) – disadvantaged pupils tend to have less access to swimming than those who are not pupil premium</i>
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	53%	
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	53%
