E Scooter information from Thames Valley Police

We know many people will be buying or receiving e-scooters as gifts this Christmas, but many will not be aware of the legalities on their use. Before you buy, please bear in mind the following:-

Personal e-scooters -

- These are for use on private land only.
- These are illegal on any public highway.
- You Cannot get insurance to ride these on the road.

This is because e-scooters are classed as motor vehicles in law. In theory, this means that you need an MOT, road tax and insurance to use one, however it isn't currently possible to register e-scooters in this way.

Privately owned e-scooters Can only be used on private land, with the permission of the landowner.

You Cannot use a privately owned e-scooter on the road, pavement or in a public space. If you do then you risk receiving a large fine, points on your driving licence and your e-scooter could be seized.

Rental e-scooters -

Some parts of the UK are running government trials of rental escooters. If you're over 16 and have a full or provisional driving licence, then you can use these on public roads and Cycle paths. Please check that your driving licence covers you

Decomposition Breaking down into parts

Break it Down



Activity

Ask your child to choose an item they can see. Ask them to sketch it and break it down by labelling as many different parts as possible. This can be run as a competition – who can break it down the most?

Learning

In computing decomposition allows us to break complex tasks into more manageable tasks. Here your child practises decomposing objects around them.



Activity

Ask your child to look at their own garden or think of a local green space and break it down into different parts.

Grass, patio, decking, pond, vegetable patch. Get them to design their own perfect garden by sketching ideas for each part.

Learning

Here your child has made the task of designing a garden easier by breaking it down and looking at each section separately.

Comic Flick Book



Activity

With your child, cut, fold and staple paper into a little flick book. Ask them what they want to happen in their animation and together break this down into steps for the drawings on each page.

Learning

Here your child has decomposed the animation into a sequence of individual images. What other animations can your child create?



Activity

Ask your child to think up a new app. This could be a game, fitness or travel app for example. Ask them to create a design for the app by breaking it down and sketching out the different screens the user will see.

Learning

Decomposing the app down into the different screens allows your child to create a design to illustrate how their app would work.

Dodgy Dance Moves



Activity

With your child select a favourite party song which you can learn the dance to, such as the YMCA or Macarena. To learn the moves, break the song down into different sections, then look at the actions for each section.

Learning

Decomposing the dance sequence down into verse, chorus and then smaller chunks makes the task of learning the moves easier.


This week, The Robins have been practising measuring, cutting and joining skills in DT using hacksaws, bench-hooks and glue guns. We worked in teams and create little star decorations! In science, we completed some work on solubility of substances; we used evaporation to recover salt from a solution and then made observations using a magnifying class. Did you know that the slower the evaporation process, the larger the crystals that will form? In preparation for Christmas, we are studying the Dance of the Sweeties from Mathhew Bourne's version of The Nutcracker. Currently, we have learnt the dance of the Gobstoppers and then developed the dance adding some of our own ideas. I wonder which sweets the Robins will choose next as a stimulus for their dance?

Scientists have found more flowering plants, moss, and algae in Antarctica in the last 10 years than usually grow in 50 years, and the extent of floating sea ice there has hit record lows. Polar explorer and environmentalist, Robert Swan, has been so concerned about the radical changes to Antarctica that he founded the 2041 Foundation, with the aim of ensuring the preservation of Antarctica through the promotion of recycling, renewable energy, and sustainability to combat the effects of climate change. The charity, 2041 School, encourages young people to learn more about the initiative.
